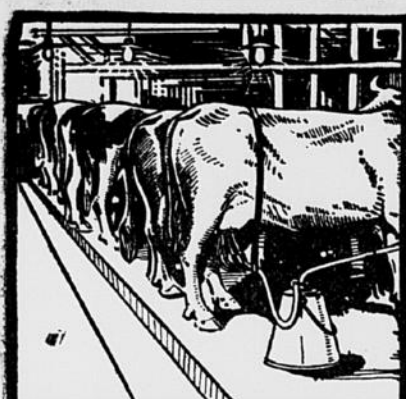

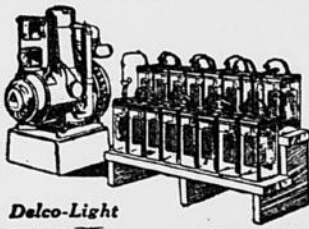

NORTH DAKOTA

Fargo.—Rev. G. S. Bascom, aged 73, a retired clergyman well known in many parts of the state, is dead.

Jamestown.—The United States war department has arranged for a conference of North and South Dakota army instructors to be held here on November 7 and 8.

Bismarck.—"Jimmy" O'Brien, former convict at the North Dakota penitentiary, it is said, is now General Pershing's personal barber at military headquarters in France.

Garrison.—Three enlisted men from this city in Camps Custer and Fremont were reported among the victims of influenza and its resultant complications within the past week.

Fargo.—A publicity department for the united war work campaign in North Dakota has been opened here. The drive will be conducted during the week of November 11-18.

Kensal.—An automobile which unfortunately became "stalled" on a Soo railroad crossing near here, got what would naturally be expected, but the driver managed to escape unhurt.

Fargo.—North Dakota boys' and girls' clubs organized under the direction of the state agricultural college, were asked to assist in protecting property, for patriotic reasons, against acts of vandalism on Halloween.

Bismarck.—Governor Frazier has honored requisitions from New York for the return of Arthur Colby and William A. Delaney, escaped convicts from Auburn prison, who were apprehended at Carrington.

Bismarck.—Suit has been brought

by the State of North Dakota against four well-known grain elevator companies, foreign corporations doing business in the state, on the charge of unlawful combination in fixing the prices to be paid for grain.

Forman.—St. Joseph county has recently taken the lead of North Dakota counties in subscriptions for war savings stamps. The county is credited with having recently totaled purchases in the sum of \$122,527, or an average of \$12.70 for each person.

Bismarck.—Resources of \$117,307.100.75, \$2,110,674.33 more than a year ago, \$3,202,377.88 over the call of June 29, 1918, and the highest point reached in the history of the state are shown by 694 state banks and four trust companies who responded to the call of Aug. 31, 1918.

Burnstad.—Mrs. Lloyd Smith was found dead at her home near here, and is supposed to have been accidentally shot by one of her two young children with a shotgun that had been lying near. The husband was at work about two miles distant when the tragedy occurred.

Grand Forks.—Authorities of this county have figured up a total of \$4,650 paid out for care of an aged inmate of the state insane hospital, who died last week after a lingering illness there. The patient was Anton Anderson, who was committed to the hospital from this county 25 years ago.

Marion.—That every county in the state had gone "over the top" with its quota of subscriptions on the fourth Liberty loan, was indicated in preliminary reports given out by Chairman Wesley C. McDowell a few days ago. Owing to the busy season and wide prevalence of sickness, complete reports, it was stated, would probably not be available for several days.

Belfield.—One of the interesting features of a Red Cross auction held here was the sale of a wagon lost by General Custer on crossing Davis creek while en route to meet his fate at the hands of Sitting Bull's Sioux at Little Big Horn, in July, 1876. The axle of the wagon was exhumed from the bed of the creek only a couple of weeks ago by "Dad" Brownfield, a resident.

Jamestown.—With two fingers shot from one hand while hunting near Vashti, this county, R. G. McFarland, Republican candidate for county judge of Stutsman county, drove his automobile from Vashti to Jamestown before he could obtain aid. The index and middle fingers of the left hand were shot off, and McFarland underwent excruciating pain while he made the long drive unaided.

Devils Lake.—It is claimed that an undue number of fatalities followed cases of Spanish influenza in many parts of the state owing to the unwise efforts of friends to move patients for considerable distances to points where it was believed they could have better medical care. Physicians advise that one of the most important requisites in handling the malady is to give the patient immediate and absolute rest.

Fargo.—L. B. Mathieson, who has gained considerable recent publicity through a succession of alleged crimes, arrests and escapes, is again in custody after spending several weeks as a fugitive. Mathieson saved his way to liberty from a jail at Grand Forks, where he was last under arrest. The charges against him include desertion from military service at Camp Dodge and a number of thefts and frauds, which are alleged to have perpetrated in various parts of North Dakota and the northwest. He was originally sent to Camp Dodge in the draft from this county last May, and will probably be returned there for attention before facing such charges as have been placed against him.

Valley City.—Major Charles F. Mudgett, well known army man in service from this city, has been made a lieutenant colonel.

Mandan.—Jesse Starkweather, charged with the murder of William Osterman, was found guilty of manslaughter and sentenced to serve ten years in the state penitentiary. Starkweather has figured in western North Dakota courts for several years, having first been convicted of cattle stealing. He subsequently escaped and was not apprehended until his arrest, charged with the killing of Osterman, when his identity as the fugitive became known.

Steele.—Unusual suffering was experienced here during the more critical stages of the influenza epidemic which has been raging in various parts of the state. The only physician in the city at the time was confined to his bed through illness, and no medical attention was procurable for several days. A number of deaths resulted before the malady was placed under control.

Devils Lake.—A pathetic tragedy took place in the life of a promising young woman when Miss Lucile Loveland of Waterloo, Iowa, arrived here to be united in marriage with Roger L. Due of this city and found she was only in time to attend his funeral. The groom died on the eve of his intended wedding day, and Miss Loveland, the prospective bride, is now prostrated with illness.

Minot.—John Zakschewskie, alias Stupard, 22-year-old Austrian said to be wanted in Stanley for failure to register, as well as for alleged burglary and resisting an officer, has been arrested here. During the first week in August he fought off a posse in Mountrail county and escaped with a rifle to the hills in the southern part of the county. Upon his arrival here he was recognized and taken into custody.

Washburn.—From deep mourning to high rejoicing is the transition in the feelings of the people of Washburn and vicinity by the news that Private Carl A. E. Knudsen, one of its most popular young men, reported killed in action in France on September 12, is still fighting the Hun. The information came in a telegram from Adjutant General Harris, at Washington, telling the mother that her son is "now reported on duty with his company."

Mandan.—The residence of Joseph M. Devine, superintendent of the state training school, was badly damaged in a recent fire.

Bismarck.—Justice J. E. Robinson of the state supreme court has issued a letter to the daily press of the state giving what he calls a "complete and absolute knock-out to the bone-dry statute." The justice declares that the statute was not legally passed by the legislature, and that its enforcement, untested by the courts, is working detriment to public health through the shutting off of liquors needed for medicinal purposes.

CAN'T GET ALONG TOGETHER

Women Won't Work for Women When They Can Help It, Always Preferring Men Bosses.

A "mere man," writing in Woman's Home Companion, makes this comment on women in business.

"Another reason I have noted why women don't appropriate the big jobs is that most members of their own sex—to say nothing of the members of ours—would rather work for a man than a woman. The most successful woman I know is the head of a big department in a very big business. She knows that her feminine instinct is worth thousands to that business. Yet she is glad that the president of the business is a man; she wouldn't take the president's job if she could get it; and no matter how much she believes in her own instinct, she recognizes that there is an element of judgment in the man that, working with her instinct, produces a perfect combination. "I hired a stenographer once, for instance, and assigned her to a woman. At noon of the first day she went out to lunch and did not come back. I found a laconic note on her desk. It read: 'I won't take dictation from a woman.' Any man or any woman in business can give similar testimony. Women would rather work for men than work for women."

Merely to hear the sound of music gives one the dancing impulse—an inclination to move the feet or the hands or the body in time with the rhythm of the music. To make your exercise attractive, therefore, start your music first and then as you feel the swing of it you will find pleasure in going through your exercises. Make it a part of your daily schedule. BEEES FOR WAR MESSENGERS

Their Employment Is Said to Have Gone Far Beyond the Range of Probability.

A secret long cherished in the British war department has just been discovered—the use of bees as messengers.

No longer will the alde de camp spur his staggering horse through shot and shell to carry the message to the front. Instead he will don his gloves and mask, and, going to the portable beehive back of headquarters, seize one of the faithful little insects, and send the well-trained messenger through the air.

Whoever possesses a receiving outfit can read the secrets of the wireless; one can cut the wires of the ordinary telegraph, and the pigeon does not always escape the bullet.

Therefore, other means have been sought. In America, the general staff dreams of using as a dispatch bearer—the bee.

The bee, like the carrier pigeon, guided by its marvelous instinct, returns to the hive from wherever he may be liberated. Tiny dispatches, which can be deciphered with the magnifying glass, can be attached to its breast.

But something better still has been found. By an ingenious process the wings of the tiny insect are sensitized, and by means of microscopic photography the message is imprinted thereon.

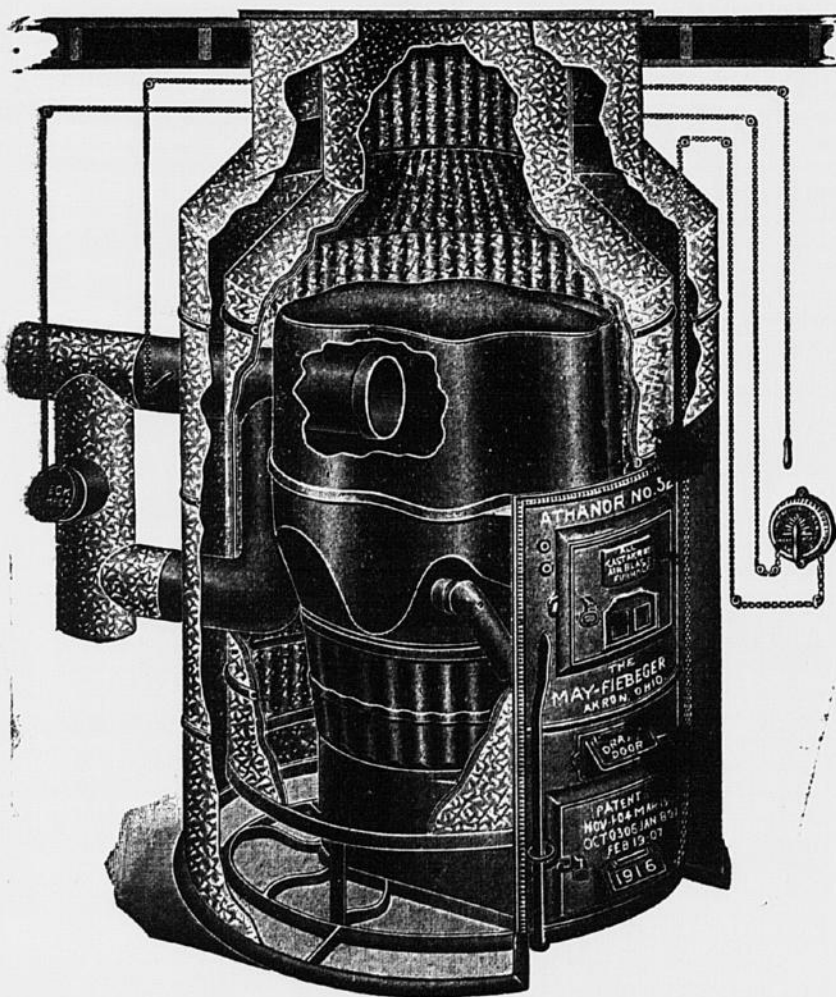
